Winter Weather Driving Tips

- Be alert and aware of weather conditions.
- Allow extra time when traveling in bad weather.
- Keep a longer distance between you and the vehicle in front of you on the road.
- Accelerate and decelerate your vehicle slowly. If the wheels start to lock up when applying the brakes, ease off the brake pedal.
- Drive with your headlights on.
- Make sure you have windshield cleaner so you can keep your windshield clean of salt and spray from other vehicles.
- Remember that bridges, overpasses and infrequently



traveled roads often freeze first. Keep in mind that even when temperatures are above freezing, if the road conditions are wet, ice can be present in the shady areas of normal roadways and also on exposed roadways such as bridges.

- Be aware of the pavement conditions when entering or exiting your vehicle. Watch out for slippery conditions such as rain and puddles, ice and snow, and uneven surfaces. This will help reduce trip, slip, and fall accidents.

• Always wear your seatbelt!

A Note from the Water Department

Water bills are due on the 15th of the month. The penalties (late fees) are applied on the 16th and the shut off letters are also sent out on the 16th. If you paid your bill on the 16th there's a chance that your payment and the shut off letter could cross in the mail. This means that you will still receive the letter even though your bill is paid. Red door hangers indicating the date of shut off will be hung on the 22nd. On the 23rd of the month water will be shut off.

Frozen Pipe Prevention

With temperatures possibly plummeting over the next several weeks, frozen pipes continue to be a concern.

Water inside inadequately insulated pipes can freeze and exert pressure of up to 2,000 lb./sq. inch, stopping water from flowing through the pipes, interrupting service to the home or worse, pipes will rupture and cause costly damage. In fact, frozen pipes are the second most common cause of home insurance claims in the U.S. according to the Insurance Information Institute (III).

Here are some tips to prevent your pipes from freezing:

1. Foam: Insulate pipes exposed to the elements or cold drafts. For as little as \$1 per 6' of insulation, you can stop pipes from freezing and save energy.

2. Dome: Placing an insulating dome or other coverings on outdoor faucets and spigots also

reduce the likelihood of the water in your home pipes freezing or expanding and causing a costly leak.

3. Drip: Letting your faucets drip will reduce the build-up of pressure in the pipes, especially the faucets on the outside wall of your house. Even if the pipes freeze, you will have released the pressure from the water system reducing the likelihood of a rupture.

If you are going out of town and you suspect the temperatures will drop, turn off the water to your home and open all of the taps to drain the water system. This way you will not return to a frozen, soggy mess.

4. Open: Leave the cabinet doors open under your kitchen sink and any other sink that is facing the outside wall. This lets the warmth of the house flow under the sink and keeps the pipes from freezing.
